OREGON CENTENNIAL SOUVENIRS with BONNIE "HATCHECK GIRL" LaDOE



In honor of Oregon's Sesquicentennial, we thought it would be fun to look back at past celebrations, so PROG's February program consisted of Oregon commemorative souvenirs.

Oregon became the 33rd State on February 14, 1859. In 1959 President Eisenhower proclaimed Oregon's 100th Anniversary.

Our own Bonnie LaDoe played a part at the Oregon Statehood Banquet, the kickoff dinner for the Oregon Centennial on February 14, 1959, in the lobby of the U.S. Bank building in downtown Portland.

Bonnie was working at U.S. Bank at the time, and she and all the other cute, young female employees were recruited to help at the banquet. Bonnie's job was as a hatcheck girl, and all the teller stations in the lobby were turned into coat/hatcheck stations. Bonnie showed a photo of the banquet, and it was a huge affair—so huge, in fact, that Bonnie's station didn't show that clearly, but we know she was there, right along with keynote speaker Richard Nixon!

Oregon's Centennial theme was "Frontier of the Future," and there were celebrations throughout the state. The largest and most lavish was the Oregon Centennial Exposition and International Trade Fair held at what is now the Portland Expo Center in North Portland. The Exposition looked back at Oregon's past accomplishments and its frontier days through exhibits, cultural events, architecture and food. The Centennial was the largest fair held in the west since the 1939 Golden Gate Expo in San Francisco. There were 1,335,082 paid admissions.

Many companies had exhibits at the Centennial. Northwest Natural Gas had an eternal flame at the entrance of the Expo Center. Portland General Electric had a display in which Xerox showed the first photocopier. Frontier Village had saloons and dance hall girls. Portland's steam train and the Zoo Liner are from the Centennial.

The official Centennial emblem is found on many souveniers. It has so many elements in it that it is easy to overlook their meaning. Among these are Products and Industries of Oregon, the State Seal, and a covered wagon reading "Frontier of the Future." Bonnie showed several different plates, cups & saucers and salt & peppers with the emblem. Bonnie also showed an unusual powder bowl featuring Oregon's old Capitol building. Johnson Brothers made red, blue and brown Lewis and Clark souvenir plates that were sold at Meier and Frank. Although they do look like the older Lewis & Clark plates, they are marked on the back. The Centennial bow ties were sold as souvenirs. There were also Jim Beam Centennial bottles. Sally Cole showed a set of Centennial tumblers in a cute wire holder.

Many of the official souvenir china items were made at Viletta's Art Studio in Roseburg, Oregon. And in fact, a group of Roseburg businessmen came up with the idea of sending a wagon train carrying mail from Independence MO to Oregon. It left in April of 1959 and arrived here in August 1959.

There were stage shows every day during the Centennial. Carole White's father played in the house band for all the traveling acts including Ricky Nelson and the Everly Brothers. Carole and her sister got to meet a lot of stars that summer! The Takarazuka Dance Theatre from Japan was part of the International Fair. Sandra Millius showed their souvenir program.

Centennial tokens were sold for \$1.00 and could be redeemed at the Expo for 50 cents, with the difference going to the various communities to mount their regional or neighborhood exhibits. One of the most notable of these is the 31' tall Paul Bunyon statue that still stands at the intersection of N. Denver and N. Interstate in the Kenton district.

To round out the display, Mark Moore brought commemoratives of the Lewis & Clark Expo and Oaks Park including postcards, glass and china, and Carole White brought Portland restaurant menus, glass and china.
