ANCHOR HOCKING'S MOONSTONE

With Debbie Larsen

Anchor Hocking was originally the Hocking Glass Company, then Anchor Cap & Closure, and finally Anchor Hocking.

They are best known for Fire King, but made Moonstone from 1942 to 1946. (Not to be confused with New Martinsville Moondrops that bears no resemblance to Moonstone.)

Moonstone was sold in dime stores such as Newberrys. The set included plates, bowls, sherbets, and other accessory pieces, but no dinner plates.

Debbie also brought a Fenton opalescent serving bowl that is larger than Moonstone's.

Neal and Barbara have been collecting stemware for years. She has a nice assortment of vintage Cambridge goblets and wines, as well as examples from other companies. Neal brought a dozen examples of American and European goblets, including those from Germany, Austria, Hungary, France, Ireland and England.

Most stemware sets of the 1920s and 30s came with clarets and wines. As time went by and tastes changed, glass companies moved away from the smaller clarets and wines and offered larger stems such as larger wines and cocktails.

Susan Conroy, Diane Foster, Jewell Gowan, Gyrid Hyde-Towle and Joi Shervey all brought examples from their collections to share.
